### On Saturday, October 9, 2004 LEVS Celebrates Leif Ericson Day in Phila., PA

It is a sight that you only get to see once a year - the *Norseman* slowly making her way up the Schuylkill River, passing startled scullers and causing joggers along Kelly Drive to turn their heads.

When the ship "lands" at the statue of Thorfin Karlsefni on the western end of Boat House Row, it is usually the costumed Vikings and other Scandinavians dressed in traditional garb that get the attention of the passers-by.

The ceremony will begin at 12 noon once the *Norseman* lands, and will continue with the reading of the President's proclamation as well as the

City of Philadelphia's. There will also be short speeches from keynote speakers, and then we will place a wreath at the foot of the Viking statue.

At 6:30 PM we will continue our celebration with a Leif Ericson Day banquet, held at the Renaissance Hotel in Philadelphia. The *Norseman* and her crew have had an exciting year of events, and will have a display of photos that will highlight the year. The banquet will be a great opportunity for you to meet the crew and the other members of our organization.

Please plan to attend these festivities, and help us celebrate the historical fact that "Leif Landed First"!

# The Proclamation of Leif Ericson Day is 40 Years Old!

On September 2nd, 1964
President Lyndon B. Johnson,
backed by a unanimous Congress,
proclaimed October 9th "Leif Ericson
Day" in commemoration of the first
arrival of a European on North American soil.
The law gave subsequent presidents the right to
celebrate this day as well.

According to Ivar Christensen, President of the Leif Ericson Society International, October 9th was selected because October 9th, 1825 was the arrival date of the first Norwegian immigrant ship, the *Restauration*, which landed in New York from Norway on that date.

The proclamation shown in the box to the right was written by President George W. Bush for last year's celebration.

#### A Proclamation

Traveling across the Atlantic as the first Nordic to lead an expedition to North America, Leif Erikson showed great courage in the face of danger. His actions marked the beginning of a longstanding exchange of people, ideas, and innovations between North America and the Nordic nations of Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway, and Sweden. As the United States celebrates Leif Erikson Day, we honor his historic voyage and give thanks for the many contributions of Nordic Americans to our Nation, and of our Nordic allies.

Since Leif Erikson's voyage, millions of immigrants from the Nordic countries have come to America. As teachers, lawyers, judges, doctors, authors, athletes, artists, scientists, and business people, and in many other occupations, Nordic Americans have contributed to America's cultural, political, and economic strength. America has also benefited from the diplomatic relationships we have long enjoyed with the Nordic nations.

To honor Leif Erikson, Nordic-American heritage, and Americas continued relationship with Nordic countries, the Congress, by joint resolution (Public Law 88-566) approved on September 2, 1964, has authorized and requested the President to proclaim October 9 of each year as "Leif Erikson Day."

NOW, THEREFORE, I, GEORGE W. BUSH, President of the United States of America, do hereby proclaim October 9, 2003, as Leif Erikson Day. I call upon all Americans to observe this day with appropriate ceremonies, activities, and programs to honor our rich Nordic-American heritage.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this ninth day of October, in the year of our Lord two thousand three, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred and twenty-eighth.

### Focus On: Maia and Aaron Holt A Couple of Vikings

Maia and Aaron Holt were "found" for our organization three years ago through a rather amazing coincidence. "Kinda a neat story" said Maia, "Aaron has a younger sister named Sarah, who in high school took a photography class. She decided to photograph us for a class project. Aaron was dressed in a 'Viking' costume and I was in a



'wenchy' costume. Later on in the school year at the annual art show for the school, Sarah's photos were displayed. Enter Wolf Sutton. Wolf's daughter Lauren was in the same grade as Sarah and also a photo student. Voila, Wolf saw the photos of us, and one thing lead to another."

They joined the crew because it was something they could do together, and they had an interest in the Viking age as an extension to their more generic interest in early European cultures and history. Although their Viking knowledge was great, their boating experience was a bit lacking. "I did go canoeing once!" joked Maia.

Since joining, Maia has researched many aspects of daily life and the role of women such as clothing, dyeing, weaving, food preparation, crafts and the tools and processes to achieve each. She sewed her costumes by hand and learned to spin with a drop spindle and tablet weave.

Both Maia and Aaron are working on correcting misconceptions about the Vikings. Said Aaron, "A lot of what are viewed as misconceptions about the Vikings are actually only misconceptions about Scandinavians as a whole in the 'Viking age'. The context in which the word 'Viking' was used throughout that time period for Scandinavians, Icelanders, Germans, Englishmen etc. was 'sea-borne raider' or 'pirate', not as a name for Scandinavians at large. One could hardly imagine a Northumbrian monk pulling his bed linens over his head and praying that God protect him from Danish merchants."

In addition to correcting misconceptions, Aaron and Maia find themselves responding to some humorous questions. "The most common question for me is 'Does that boat go in the water?", said Maia. Aaron quipped, "I've heard 'Is red hair accurate?""

Maia and Aaron would like to see the organization get "on the same page" in what is represented to the public, as well as further education on the Viking age. Aaron recommends Gwyn Jones' *History of the Vikings*. "It offers a pretty good over-all narrative of the period without losing sight of the forest for the trees. It's a good place to start for a sound knowledge of the time-period, and you can find it at almost any library if not a bookstore."



Check out the (mostly) true story about our first ship (the Ravnen) and her final resting place.



A Recipe for Viking Bread



#### **Ingredients:**

- 2 cups of flour
- 1 cup of whole grain flour
- 1 teaspoon of dry yeast
- 1 teaspoon of salt
- 1 cup of comestible grains
- 2 cups of warm water.

#### **Preparation:**

- 1. Put all the flour in a bowl with the salt and mix it. Put the dry yeast in the warm water until it melts, then add it to the flour in the bowl. The Vikings used dry green peas but we've substituted the grain of the sunflower. Put half of the grain into the bowl, mix.
- 2. Pour in our water with yeast and mix it with a wooden spoon, until it is hard to stir, then hand knead the dough. Add flour as needed so that the dough doesn't stick to our hands.
- 3. When the dough is nicely kneaded and doesn't stick put it on an oiled pan. Take the remaining grain and sprinkle them on top of your bread.
- 4. Put it in a cool oven, it will help the rising process. While it rises, set the oven to around 190° and let it cook for about 1 hour.


